FIRST STEPS

STEP 1



GATHER WHAT YOU HAVE:

- Search for documents at home.
- Ask family for any research or documents they may have.

STEP 2



ORGANIZE:

- Identify your vital information (birth, death and marriage). Then identify vital information for your parents, grandparents and other generations in your family.
- Fill out a pedigree chart.

STEP 3



DECIDE WHAT YOU WANT TO KNOW:

- Who are you researching?
- What do you want to know about them?
- Where and when are you researching?

Once you have completed these three steps, you can then review various sources that can help you learn more about your family history!

GOVERNMENT

Official government records are an excellent source for genealogy research. Some useful government records are listed below.

CENSUS

Since 1790, the United States provides a census of its population every ten years and this information can provide additional assistance in your research.

- Names of Other Household Members
- Ages and Birthplaces
- Residence or Occupation
- Immigration and Citizenship Details
- Marriage Information
- Military Service

FAMILY DOCUMENTS

Family or personal papers may include records that can span multiple generations. Ask your family if they have any of the documents listed below.

- Letters
- Legal Documents
- Photographs
- Memorabilia
- School Records
- Written Accounts

INTERVIEW FAMILY



Interviewing your family is a great way to learn more about your family. Here is a list of some possible questions. A recording device is useful so that you don't miss important information.

- Were you named after anyone?
- What were your parents' names?
- What do you remember about your childhood home?
- What did your home look like?
- In which room did most family activities take place?
- What was your neighborhood like?
- What did you do for fun when you were growing up?
- Tell me about your parents.
- What kind of people were your ancestors?
- What do you remember most about them?
- Was anyone in our family famous or notorious?
- What do you remember about the family stories?
- How did the family earn money?
- Who worked?


